
MESSAGE FOR DECEMBER

There are so many Faith in Action programs your council can do to make your "Light" shine more.

As the Holy Scriptures said:

"You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hidden. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven. (Matthew 5:13-16)

And if I may add, as what 1 Corinthians Chapter 13 says, "If I speak in the tongues of men or of angels, but do not have love, I am only a resounding gong or a clanging cymbal." This is the same with what we do. Whatever we do if it is not out of love for God and our neighbor, it has no value and no meaning. Our mindset and outlook should be Christ-centered and Christ-like. We should work from our hearts for Christ, in Christ, and with Christ in our hearts. Jesus Christ must be in us. We must be His instrument. And our words and especially our actions should reflect this.

UPCOMING PROGRAMS

1. State Program for December - Consecration to the Holy Family

Families today face many struggles, both through cultural pressure and through the personal struggles that accompany family life. Despite these struggles — and partly as a result of conquering them — families have great capacity for love and joy, a joy that is strengthened through the peace and truth found in Christ. To assist families in living out this joy of Christ, Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori has composed a prayer through which families may come together to consecrate themselves under the protection of the Holy Family. We invite every family in the parish to engage in the Consecration to the Holy Family.

2. Keep Christ in Christmas

The Keep Christ in Christmas (KCIC) Program brings all KCIC activities together under one umbrella. It encourages councils to prompt their neighbors to shift from a preoccupation with materialism to the light of Christ and the spirit of giving. KCIC activities include whatever efforts best suit the parish and community of a particular council and do not need to originate from the Supreme Council.

Simbang Gabi

Simbang Gabi celebrations began in the Philippines in 1668 when Spanish missionaries brought the practice from Mexico as part of their evangelization. At the time, they had a tradition of celebrating pre-Christmas novena Masses in honor of the Annunciation. These Masses were known as "Misa de Gallo" or "rooster Mass," because they were celebrated early in the morning to accommodate farmers, who often start work before sunrise to escape the heat in the fields.

Simbang Gabi (Filipino for "Evening or Night Mass"), also called Misa de Aguinaldo ("gift mass"), is a devotional novena practice of a nine-day series of Masses attended by Filipino Catholics in anticipation of Christmas and to honor the Blessed Mother. It traditionally begins during Advent on December 16 and ends on December 24. It is similar to the nine dawn Masses leading to Christmas Eve practiced in Puerto Rico called Misa de Aguinaldo. Here in the US, this nine-day series of Masses is held in the evening or at dawn and is now celebrated by Filipino Catholics and non-Filipino Catholics.

Posadas/Journey to the Inn

With the bustle of Christmas shopping and the frequent removal of religious imagery from Christmas displays, it seems that communities have forgotten the incredible gift of Christ and the beauty of his birth. What should we, as Knights of Columbus, do in the face of this secularism? How can we teach our communities that Christmas is a holy day celebrating the birth of Christ? Such questions, of course, are not wholly new; Franciscan missionaries in the 16th-century faced similar concerns when first introducing Christ and his beloved Mother to the New World. In the tradition of their founder, St. Francis of Assisi, the missionaries found that simple reenactments of the story of Christ's birth could touch the hearts of the Mexican people. The Spanish missionaries referred to these ceremonies as Las Posadas — meaning "the inns" or "the shelters" — as they gave emphasis to Mary and Joseph's search for shelter before Our Savior's birth. These festivities have remained popular throughout Latin America and the southwestern United States, yet children and adults from all cultural backgrounds can use similar celebrations to embrace the true meaning of the Christmas season and share the joy of Christ's birth.

3. Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe (under Cultural Devotional Practices) Nuestra Señora de Guadalupe, also known as Our Lady of Guadalupe, refers to when the Virgin Mary, appeared before Saint Juan Diego in Mexico in 1531. She holds a special place in the culture and religious life of many Catholics throughout the United State, Mexico, and many countries.

This day has become important for Mexican Americans to celebrate their religious and cultural identity. In preparation for the feast day, many individuals in the community erect altars in their home. In many cases they are made of a painting of Our Lady of Guadalupe that is surrounded by candles and flowers. Celebrations usually include a time of prayer, fanfare/festivities, dance presentations, parades and fireworks.

We as Knights must be at the center of such celebrations and take an active role since Our Lady of Guadalupe is the Patroness of the Knights of Columbus,

4. Campesinos (Farmworkers) Program

In line with St. Mother Teresa's concern for the needy and the poor and her "together we can do great things", this program will initiate for the farmworkers and their families BOX of HOPE, The GIFT of WARMTH, and SHOWER of LOVE.

Through BOX of HOPE, the Knights, on days before Christmas, will deliver boxes of food for a Christmas Dinner to families in need. This activity is in line with the Family Programs' Food for Families.

Through The GIFT of WARMTH, Knights will provide children and young adults coats to keep them warm during cold weather. This activity is in line with the Community Programs' Coats for Kids.

Through SHOWER of LOVE, the Knights of Columbus will provide support, like a collection of items for a baby (diapers, clothes, bottles, etc) for pregnant women, mothers and their new children. This activity is in line with Life Programs' Aid and Support After Pregnancy (ASAP).

5. March for Life (Show public support for the right to life)

The Knights of Columbus encourages others to choose life through public support of the pro-life cause. Knights can sponsor, promote, and participate in existing local, state, provincial and national marches. They can also organize bus trips. Councils in areas without existing events can organize new rallies, walks and marches on their own or by coordinating with other pro-life organizations. **For additional information, visit kofc.org/march.**

It's very important that you submit Form 10784 immediately after each council event.

For **July**, there were **61** forms submitted from **24** councils.

For **August**, there were **81** forms submitted from **34** councils.

For **September**, there were **114** forms submitted from **37** councils.

For **October**, there were **137** forms submitted from **44** councils.

There has been continued improvement from month to month but we need to continue encouraging submission of forms, especially since we have **732** councils in our State.
